Key activities undertaken in 2022


 Increased global visibility of the Nairobi Convention at One Ocean Summit, Brest, Paris 9-11 Feb by Environment Minister of Madagascar

Key activities undertaken in 2022

- Partnership: Strengthening management effectiveness and sustainably managing coral reef areas crucial to coastal livelihoods and ecosystems in **Comoros** (August, ongoing)
- Partnership: Launch of the status report on Western Indian Ocean sharks and rays (12 Oct). Printing of the report ongoing.
- Comoros marine litter action plan (ongoing). Tanzania?
- Seychelles marine litter action plan?
- Zanzibar coastal water quality assessment



Impact Created

- 1. Awareness of the Nairobi Convention as a key player in regional ocean governance, ecosystem-based management approaches and tools, and assessments,
- Increasing demand for strategic partnerships for blue growth initiatives (SADC, IGAD, AU-IBAR), Marine Spatial Planning, ecosystem monitoring, fisheries assessments, capacity building e.g. for MPA
- 3. Increasing interests of Government on ocean health (Seychelles, Comoros, Tanzania, Zanzibar,)
- 4. Readiness of Governments to roll out Marine Spatial Planning at local and national level.



A REGIONAL MARINE SPATIAL PLANNING STRATEGY FOR THE WESTERN INDIAN OCEAN












Gender Considerations and Impacts In Programme Activities

- Women are increasingly being involved in marine resource management e.g. Comoros MPA management and development of marine litter action plan
- 2. Women are active participants at the policy level e.g. Seychelles, Tanzania
- 3. Regional representation at policy and technical level increasing:
 - Negotiations on amending the Protected Areas
 Protocol (7-10 Nov) has nominations F=17 M=28
 - Environment-Fisheries nexus meeting (26-29 Sept)
 F=15 M=35



Lessons Learnt

- Strategic partnerships increasing for addressing cross-cutting issues such as fisheries, pollution, ocean management and governance
- Increasing awareness of oceans amongst stakeholders
- Emerging interests of local stakeholders in co-management of marine space e.g. LMMA



Key Requests from PSC

- 1. Emphasis on exchange visits and twinning program for learning purposes and best practices including south-south cooperation for the duration of the program
- 2. Marine biodiversity conservation, protected areas, restoration of degraded habitats for nature-based solutions and resilience to climate change and marine pollution
- 3. Advancing ecosystem-based approaches to blue economic growth through assessment of GDP contribution of BE sectors at national level (e.g. ecosystems indicator monitoring)
- 4. Establish an online learning experience and capacity building from the diversity of outputs by the Programme.
